General Business: Judi showed the membership the three vests she had made. She let everyone know they could order one of a different size for \$10 each. Doug Gill bought one, so there are two available in a larger size. Joe and Tatyana each ordered different sizes.

Bill Shipp brought in the suitcase that housed the lending library that had been set up by a former member. Mike reintroduced it purpose. Don Crumley took some old discs home to see if there was any pictures on them. If so, he will put them on a DVD. We stored it in the back room where our supplies are, if anyone wants to look at anything. . .there are a number of old college geology books.

Jane Ginther asked if the club had any "club owned" equipment. Mike pointed out there are possibly two small tumblers that could be borrowed. Judi suggested that the newsletter could include a list of those willing to help others with a particular aspect of the hobby, such as wire wrapping, cabbing, etc. There was such a list at one time, but was discontinued.

Present: Judi Allison, Mike Filarski, Laura Tiffany, Doug Gill, Bill Shipp

- ✓ Programs— We started the evening discussing ideas for our 2018 programs. Using some information from last year's questionnaire and brainstorming, we came up with enough possibilities to cover the year. We also talked about various field trips and will include 3-4 in our list of activities. Judi will type those up and have them available either for the November meeting or December Christmas party.
- ✓ **Storage** Judi paid the bill through December. We discussed Irish Howard's offer to look at buying a trailer through the auctions and decided it would be too difficult to actually know what we were purchasing prior to the sale, so we opted to forego that method. Jim Bryant let us know about an enclosed trailer he would be willing to sell. Mike, Doug and Gill will coordinate to go look at it and consider if it would be a viable option.
- ✓ We also discussed the fact that there are items in the storage unit which are extraneous. We need to make decisions on what is good to keep and what can be dispensed with. We have a number of 12x12 black boxes that have been used in previous years for display of smaller items. We talked about the possibility of having those for Junior display or possibly selling them at an auction. Laura offered a storage area where we could keep the buckets of rocks out of the weather. Diatomaceous Earth



Diatomaceous earth. also known as D.E., diatomite. or kieselgur/kieselguhr, naturally is а occurring, soft, siliceous sedimentary rock that is easily crumbled into a fine white to off-white powder. It has a particle size ranging from less than 3 micrometres to more than 1 millimetre, but typically 10 to 200 micrometres. Depending on the granularity, this powder can have an abrasive feel, similar to pumice powder, and has a low density as a result of its high porosity. The typical chemical composition of oven-dried diatomaceous earth is 80 to 90% silica, with 2 to 4% alumina (attributed mostly to clay minerals) and 0.5 to 2% iron oxide.

Diatomaceous earth consists of fossilized remains of diatoms, a type of hard-shelled protist (chrysophytes). It is used as a filtration aid, mild abrasive in products including metal polishes and toothpaste, mechanical insecticide, absorbent for liquids, matting agent for coatings, reinforcing filler in plastics and rubber, anti-block in plastic films, porous support for chemical

catalysts, cat litter, activator in blood clotting studies, a stabilizing component of dynamite, and a thermal insulator.

Opal from the Diatomaceous Earth Pits in Eastern Washington

Here is a great article from the Kenniwick Lakeside rock club about the opal from the Vantage/George Washington area back in 2009:

The opal is found as waste material in a diatomaceous earth mine east of the town of Vantage, Wa. The diatomaceous earth (DE) mine lies in an old ancient lake bed, located in the Frenchman's Hills. The mining operation is a series of open pits that removes the DE, while separating out the opal and basalt.

Diatomaceous earth has many uses. The majority of the mined DE is used for filter media in the wine making industry. I've read where DE is used for rock tumble media, during the rough grind process. DE is also used as an insecticide, where the sharp edges of the silica takes care of unwanted slugs and bugs. It's also used as an optical grade polish.

The opal, called potch or common opal, shows up in many different colors and sizes. Opal is found naturally in seams in the DE, with occasional nodules within the diatom beds. I've seen opal in colors ranging from blue, purple, green, orange, red, and white, but most of the opal is a pale green or brown color. Larger pieces of opal can be found, up to 6 feet long, 4 feet wide and 3 feet thick.

I've heard where collectors have found petrified wood from this location. Other than a small limb, I have never seen a petrified tree from this location. The formation of the layers in the opal, similar to layers in an onion, have been mistaken for the growth rings a tree. There are some unconfirmed reports of freshwater coral being found. Also, there was some information at one time, from the miners that precious opal was found in a lime green jelly opal.

A prized find is the healed brecciated opal that shows small checkered patterns and the colorful jelly opals. Most of the opal is crazed, or fractured, but some solid pieces can be found. Opal has a tendency to fracture when it loses its water after being unearthed. It's common to bring some of this opal home only to find it as a pile of rubble after it crazed over time.

The solid pieces make great lapidary material. I've made many spheres and seen some very nice cabochons, bookends, and clocks made by club members. The large multi-colored pieces make great conversation pieces as yard rock.

There are times when you do not want to visit the mine, when the wind blows or when it rains. Wind will stir up the DE into a cloud of white dust and rain will make the roads into a greasy, slick muck and chances are you will get stuck.

Always wear safety glasses and gloves while working around the sharp opal, And watch for the typical biological hazards; snakes, spiders and scorpions. Always respect the mine's no trespassing signs, call to get permission prior to going. Be safe and do not dig in the vertical walls of the pit. There are plenty of piles of opal to collect from. Most of our best opal has come from these piles.

The mine only allows collecting when they are not working in the area, usually Sunday and sometimes Saturday. We have been collecting opal from the mine for over 20 years and still look forward to visiting the mine because the miners are continually removing new seams of opal. If we don't get up there and collect it, they (the mine) will bury it back into the ground during the reclaim process.

Also, if you're in the area, stop by the Ginko Petrified Forest State Park and interpretive center at Vantage for a good look at the petrified wood that's found in the area. Kevin, Tina, and Kara Newcomb Via Hardrock News, November 2013
