AFMS Rockhounds "Code of Ethics"

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials

on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.

Hatrockhounds Gem and Mineral Society Meeting Minutes June 12, 2018

President, Doug Gill was still recuperating from his surgery and Vice President, Mike Filarski was in Michigan, so Secretary, Judi Allison presided over the meeting. Rita Watterson acted as Secretary in order to practice the process.

Show: Judi said Mike had briefly spoken with Al, the Manager of EOTEC about next year's show. He quoted \$2500 to rent the entire room for the two days. Mike didn't have the opportunity to ask about the possibility of just renting half. If a show were to run an additional day; for example, Friday, the extra charge would be \$1100. Evidently the facility will not book any further out than 6 months in advance. Mike spoke about the possibility of recruiting other types of clubs or individuals to help share the cost. We will learn more as time progresses.

After all the expenses were figured we netted about \$2600 from the Show this year.

Treasurer: Judi, acting as treasurer gave a short report and stated that Mel Lambert had volunteered to act as treasurer since Laura Tiffany had resigned because of personal obligations. Shannon Lancaster officially moved to nominate Mel for the position with Tonya Abbott seconding the nomination. Additional nominations were requested from the floor. With no other nominations forthcoming a vote was taken. The motion to accept Mel Lambert as treasurer was unanimously passed. Mike Filarski, Judi Allison and Mel Lambert will go to the Banner Bank to remove Laura Tiffany as Treasurer and officially add Mel Lambert as Treasurer of the Hatrockhound Gem and Mineral Society.

General Business: Judi mentioned that the Hermiston Fun Fest is on July 14th and that the club will again pay for a booth for members to sell from as long as the individuals promote the club. The members who take advantage of this opportunity will be responsible for all aspects of the booth including set up, take down and any materials needed to manage it. Trish Ellingson and Chris Sorensen are planning on taking advantage of the opportunity. Any other club member is welcome to join them.

Judi mentioned we generally give a donation to the church for use of the facility. We have yet to do so this year. Gordon Weber moved and Margaret Free seconded that we give them \$150. Motion carried.

As a member of the Chamber of Commerce, the club received an invitation to the open house for the new Eastern Oregon Telecom building to be held on Thursday the 14th.

Hatrockhounds are invited to the Annual Picnic and live auction held by the Lakeside Club. This year it will be on September 16. The club supplies chicken and members bring pot luck items. Food is served at noon and the auction starts at 1:00pm. Sellers receive a 70-30% split. It will be held at the Union Street Library Park.
